2pm - "Pay Attention to What They Tell You to Forget: Stories of New Hampshire's Labor History" - Andy Davis, Storyteller and former WFC co-director

A dramatization of little known tales of the struggles of the Granite State's working people. From the strike of the Cocheco "mill girls" in 1828 to the 1920 Palmer Raids in which hundreds of accused Communists were rounded up in 8 NH towns to the McCarthy Era wave of persecution, these stories come from the real individuals who lived this history. Andy will share tales of courage and reflect on how this history lives on today.
