- June 15-17 THE SCHOOL OF LIVING
- June 23-30 WOMEN'S LIBERATION, HUMAN LIBERATION: learning to free ourselves from culturally imposed roles and become creatively assertive. Program participants will include writers of the book, "Our Bodies, Ourselves" (Boston Women's Health Cooperative), leaders of N Y Radical Feminists and NOW. There will be a chartered bus for this week from New York to Conway, return.
- July 1-5 "WHO DETERMINES THE FUTURE?": a study in the theory of Socialism, connecting the ecological specter, controversies over the nature and purposes of socialism, and the needs and structure of the Third World vis-a-vis developed socialist societies. - July 8-12 "THE WAR IS NOT OVER", Vietnam, Cambodia, Laos. Russell and Irene Johnson, Program Consultant of the American Friends Service Committee, who spent a month in China as guests of Prince Sihanouk.
- July 15-19 "MUSIC, DANCE AND POETRY AS EXPRESSION AND AGENTS OF SOCIAL CHANGE." Edith Segal, poet and dance leader; Ayite Nkromah, playing African music; a representative of the Highlander Center in Tennessee; Stephen Klyce and other staff members.
- July 22-25 "THE DRUGGED SOCIETY", "Methadone and Dependence," "What Next in the Drug Culture?" Art Hudson and Cesar Valentine, drug counsellors, Lower East Side Service Center, New York.
- July 29-Aug. 2 "THE STRUGGLE CONTINUES." Walter Collins, black draft resister who spent two of 5, 5-year sentences in jail, and is working with the Southern Conference Educational Fund; and a representative from the Eastern Farm Workers Association.
- Aug. 4-9 "THE STATE OF CIVIL LIBERTIES AT HOME AND ABROAD." Willard Uphaus, Chairman, World Fellowship Board of Trustees; and representatives of the South Africa Committee and The American Indian Movement, The White Roots of Peace, from Akwesasne.
- Aug. 11-15 "THE UN DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM - Success or Failure," "CHINA FACES THE WORLD," "THE ROLE OF RELIGION IN THE MODERNIZATION OF ASIA." Dr. Ralph Buultjens, Chairman of the Council on Development, and Buddhist specialist on Asian affairs.

- Aug. 19-23 "CUBA - SYMBOL OR MODEL FOR LATIN AMERICA IN 1973 ." Prof. Philip Foner, Independence Foundation Professor of History at Lincoln University, Penna., just returned from Cuba.

GENERAL INFORMATION

Our Center is open from the last week in June until Labor Day.

The RATES per person vary from \$9.00 to \$12.00 daily depending on the accommodations, and include three family-style meals and the program. In addition to rooms in the various buildings, large tents, 14 x 14 with floors, electric light and minimum necessary equipment, are available at \$9.00 per day per person. They accommodate sizeable families. Since children form an important part of our life at World Fellowship, special rates apply. Up to 3 years, 25% of the adult rate; 4-8 years, 40%; 9-11 years, 60%; 12-21 years, student rate of \$9.00 (this minimum rate applies to all available accommodations). Campers with their own tents using bathroom facilities will be charged \$1.50 per person, per day, and shall join the Fellowship for at least one meal each day, space permitting. Reservation for a weekend is understood to mean at least 2 full days. A 15% gratuity is received from all guests for our staff.

For the sake of other guests and health regulations, we strongly suggest that YOU DO NOT BRING YOUR DOG. If, however, this should present a special hardship for you, and might prevent you from visiting us, we ask you to inform us of this when you make your reservation.

ADVANCE RESERVATIONS ARE IMPORTANT since the demand at times exceeds the available space. We welcome guests for a meal (\$1.50 for breakfast; \$2.00 for lunch; \$3.00 for dinner), a day, a week or longer. DEPOSIT of 25% of the total anticipated bill insures a reservation. Refunds of deposits are made with at least 10 days notice of cancellation; on shorter notice \$10 will be withheld as a processing fee.
