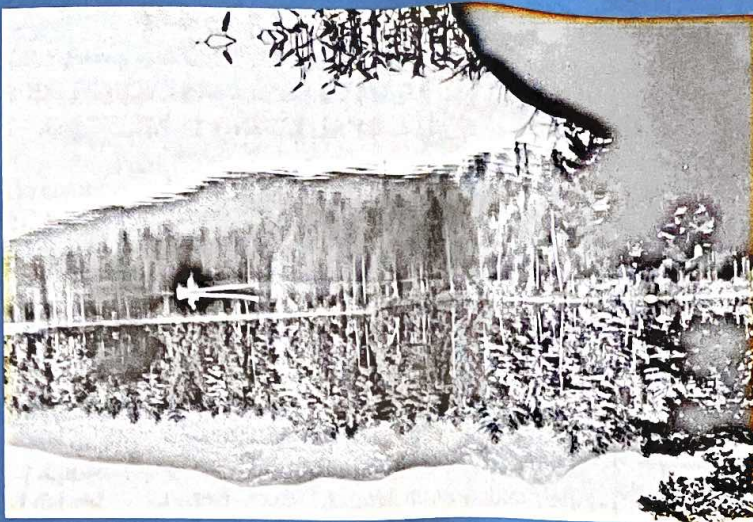

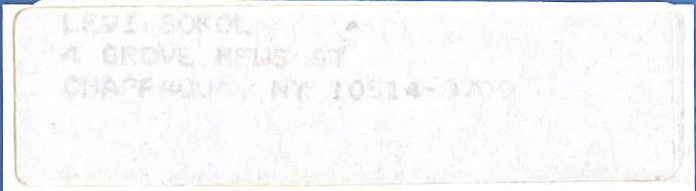

WORLD FELLOWSHIP is located on NH Route 16, 4 miles north of Chocoma, 7 miles south of Conway.

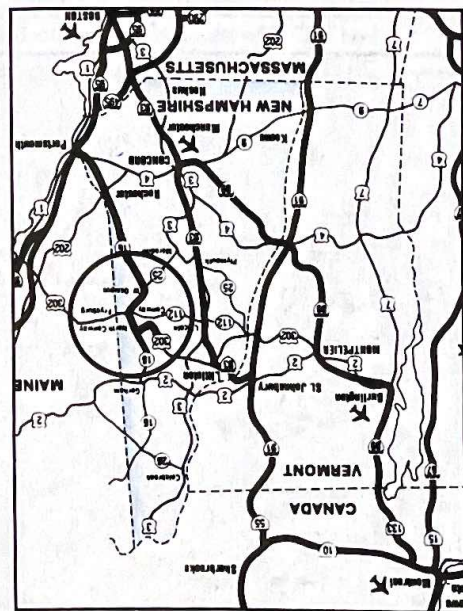
From New York, Route 95 to New Haven; Route 91 to Hartford, Route 84E to Mass. Tpk; Tpk 10 mi. to Auburn exit; Route 290 to 495N to 95N. Exit #4, to the left, before Portsmouth, NH goes onto the Spaulding Tpk. Continue to the end (exit 18). The road continues as Route 16. Four one mile, up the hill, to the main Lodge to check in.

Bus or train service to Boston. Bus service by Concord Trailways from Boston's South Station to Chocoma. We will pick you up for a small charge.

Plane service to Portland, ME., 1-1/2 hours distant. \$30 pick-up charge.

## BRIEF HISTORY OF WORLD FELLOWSHIP

- 1893 - First Parliament of Religions
- 1918 - World Fellowship of Faiths, an inter-religious, inter-cultural peace organization.
- 1941 - World Fellowship Center founded by Charles and Eugenia Weller, and Lola Maverick Lloyd, in Conway (Albany), NH on 290 acres in the White Mountains, with main Lodge and Farm House. "In Time of War Prepare for Peace." First summer's program featured a World Government Convention.
- 1953 - Willard and Ola Uphaus become Directors, in the McCarthy era.
- 1958 - Purchase of Weller House and additional 30 acres.
- 1959-60 - After 6 years of litigation, Willard Uphaus spent a year in jail in Boscawen, NH for contempt of court. (A victim of the Cold War, subversive activity was never established.)
- 1970 - Christoph and Kathryn Schmauch become Directors.
- 1982 - Uphaus Lodge purchased.
- 1992 - 51 acres purchased. Total acreage now 371.

**Location:** Set amid 370 acres in New Hampshire's White Mountains, the World Fellowship Center invites people from diverse social, intellectual, and cultural backgrounds to share their vacations and ideas in our peaceful, rustic setting. With Mt. Chocorua as our backdrop, our facilities run from the valley floor up the ridge of Drake Hill.

Our main conference center is Lloyd Lodge, which resembles a century-old New England Inn. Nearby is Uphaus Lodge, our best facility. On the valley floor, nearly a mile away, are the 200-year-old Farmhouse, the Weller House, the Cottage, and a spacious Recreation Hall. Campsites with rough tables are available for campers bringing their own tents and equipment.

Nature provides pine-scented mountain air and our buildings provide a smoke-free environment.

**Program:** We have been called a "camp with a social conscience." Each week, we host discussions and lectures, organized around social issues. The evening programs begin at 8 pm, and most mornings at 10 there is also a discussion of one of the week's themes. Guests are free to develop their own program, either at the center or in the Mt. Washington Valley area, or in the White Mountain National Forest.

**World Fellowship is** a Center that offers educational pursuits aimed at renewing body, mind, and spirit through its educational programs, environmental harmony, recreational opportunities, and the informal sharing of progressive values.

We continue in our tradition of over a half century of educational programs intended to allow our guests to arrive at informed positions on global issues.

**Recreation:** Nestled in the woods, mile-long Whitton Pond offers visitors the usual summertime pleasures: swimming, sunbathing, canoeing and rowboating, fishing, and blueberry picking. The pond is also a sanctuary for a pair of nesting loons, which return every year. At our main lodge we have basketball and volleyball courts, and a new fantasy playground for children.
