Brief History of World Fellowship

1893 First Parliament of Religions

1918 World Fellowship of Faiths, an inter-religious, inter-cultural peace organization

1941 World Fellowship Center founded by Charles and Eugenia Weller, and Lola Maverick Lloyd, in Conway (Albany), NH on 290 acres in the White Mountains, with main lodge and Farm House. "In Time of War Prepare for Peace." First summer's program featured a World Government Convention.

1953 Willard and Ola Uphaus became Directors in the McCarthy era. 1958 Purchase of Weller House and additional 30 acres.

1959-60 After 6 years of litigation, Willard Uphaus spent a year in jail in Boscawen, NH for contempt of court. (A victim of the cold War, subversive activity was never established.)



Things to Do in Our Area

During your stay at World Fellowship, you might want to explore the area. The Mt. Washington Valley of the White Mountains offers activities for every interest

Mountain Climbing - Mt. Chocorua in our "front yard"; the Presidential Range, and many others. Steamer Rides on Lake Winnipesaukee, Canoe down the Saco River Lifeguards and a large beach at nearby White Lake State Park Storyland, Children's amusement park, and Heritage New Hampshire - the state's history told by costumed persons and tableaus. A Children's Museum in Center Harbor. The Mt.

Washington Auto Road, and the Wildcat Mtn. Gondola in Pinkham Notch. Scenic Loop drive over the Kancamagus Highway, up through Franconia Notch, with the rock profile of "The Old Man of the Mountain", the Flume, Cannon Mtn. Gondola, a side-trip to historic Bretton Woods Hotel, and

back through Crawford Notch. North Conway offers outlet and factory stores of designer and outdoor clothing, as well as boutiques and artists galleries. Summer theater in Tamworth and North Conway, country dances, area festivals.

From New York, Route 95 to New Haven Route 91 to Hartford, Route 84E to Mass Tpke. Tpke E 10 mi to Auburn exit; Route 290 to 495 N to 95N. 95N Exit 4 to the left before Portsmouth, NH goes onto the Spaulding Tpke. Continue to the end (exit 18). The road continues as Route 16. Four miles north of Chocorua, our big sign is on the right, Drake Hill Rd. Go one
