resembles a century-old New England Inn. It houses the WF office, dining hall, conference room and 17 guest rooms.

Uphaus Lodge

is our most modern facility It has 9 guest rooms and a view of Mount Chocorua from a large bay window in the living room.

is over 200 years old and has 13 guest rooms. The Farmhouse Cottage, in the same area, has 6 guest rooms. They are 3/4 mile from Lloyd Lodge.
