Programs

- WF strives** to provide educational programming that will challenge, motivate, and prepare people to be active in making a better world for all.
- Lectures and discussions** are offered each morning or evening.
- Children's Fellowship** provides a 2-hour morning structure for 3-9 year-olds to play. Sun-Thurs evenings for 5-12 yr-olds.
- Youth Fellowship** offers scheduled activities during the week for explorations.
- WF nature walks** or environmental education programs are presented weekly.
- Fun Night** - share talents on stage each Friday evening!
- Cultural performance** offered each Saturday evening.
- Ad hoc activities** - Occasional offerings include handcrafts, cooking adventures, book discussions, group hikes, theatre outings...bring your craft to share.

Lodging Facilities

With Mount Chocorua as a backdrop, our facilities extend from the valley floor up the ridge of Drake Hill. All buildings are smoke-free and have shared bathroom, kitchen, dining room, and living room facilities.



Lloyd Lodge resembles a century-old New England Inn. It houses the WF office, dining hall, conference room and 17 guest rooms.

Uphaus Lodge

is our most modern facility. It has 9 guest rooms and a view of Mount Chocorua from a large bay window in the living room.



The Farmhouse is over 200 years old and has 13 guest rooms. The Farmhouse Cottage, in the same area, has 6 guest rooms. They are 3/4 mile from Lloyd Lodge.

Weller House

is a charming 175-year old cottage with 5 guest rooms. Thoreau Cottage, just behind it, has 2 guest rooms. They are almost a mile from Lloyd Lodge.



Campground

16 rustic sites with tables for campers bringing their own tent, equipment, and sleeping bag/bedding. Latest set-up is 11pm.

Recreational Facilities

World Fellowship has frontage on Whitton Pond, an enchantingly beautiful place. This mile-long lake, nestled in the woods, is a sanctuary for a pair of nesting loons, as well as for many guests, which return every year. Brief History of World Fellowship Center

1893 First Parliament of Religions, in conjunction with World Expo, Chicago

1918 League of Neighbors commenced working for Racial Unity

1929 World Fellowship of Faiths founded, an inter-religious, intercultural peace organization, bringing together the League of Neighbors for common human unity, *Union of East and West* for cultural unity, and *Fellowship of Faiths* for religious unity.

1941 World Fellowship Center founded by Charles and Eugenia Weller (with help from Lola Maverick Lloyd and scores of contributors), in Albany, NH on 290 acres in the White Mountains. The first summer's program, "In a Time of War Prepare for Peace," featured a World Government Convention.

1953 Willard and Ola Uphaus became Directors in the McCarthy era. Soon after, the NH attorney general demanded that they turn over lists of guests and presences. They refused.

1958 Purchase of Weller House and 30 acres.

1959 - 1960 Though subversive activity was never established, Willard Uphaus spent a year in jail for contempt of court after 6 years of litigation.

1970 Christoph and Kathryn (Kari) Schmauch became Directors.

1982 Uphaus Lodge purchased. During the Schmauchs' tenure the Center grew to include: Children's Fellowship; weekly cultural offerings; organic vegetable gardens; 135 additional acres; nature trails; Schmauch meeting room; directors' house... and more.

2001 Andy Davis and Andrea Walsh became Directors

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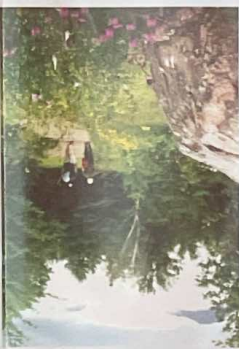

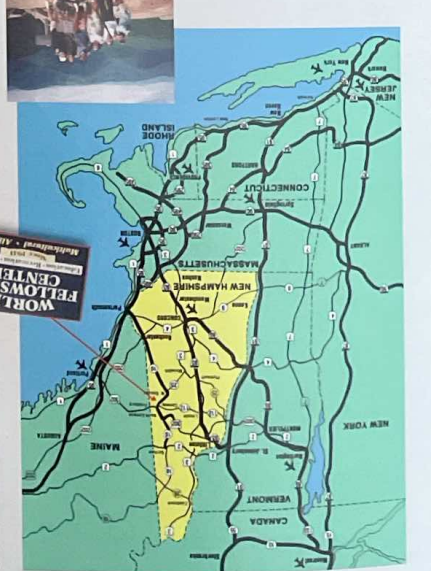
DIRECTIONS:

From New York, Route 95 to New Haven, Route 91 to Hartford, Route 84E to Mass Tpk. Tpk E 10 mi to Auburn Exit 4 to the left before Portsmouth, NH goes onto the Spaulding Tpk. Continue to the end (exit 18) which continues as Route 16. Four miles north of Chocoma, turn right at WF sign onto Drake Hill Rd. Go one mile up the hill to Lloyd Lodge office to check in.
