

#### **Dear WFC Community,**

As we write this letter, many in our community are still reeling from the outcome of the 2024 election – and struggling to find the resolve to face the challenges ahead and determination to ensure we somehow come out stronger. Against this backdrop, we write with one sense of certainty – a certainty we have felt so many times over the last year: that many people need the space that WFC offers, the space that WFC has been for so many over the last 83 years. We see our first responsibility as new Co-Executive Directors learning our role as holding this space for the many and carrying forward this long legacy.

Over the last year, we have watched this space open up and be what it must be on numerous occasions – community conversations about Gaza via Zoom in February; community conversations on the lawn on July 4 and August 6 (Hiroshima Day) and in the moments of high political uncertainty during the summer months; each time we began a World Fellowship Past, Present, and Future – Collective Visioning session during the summer season; and in the reflection circles at our spring and fall Board retreats.

We heard the voice of someone saying she had not been to WFC for 30 years, but she came to a conversation on Zoom because it was the closest that she could get to being in conversation with her parents, now late. We read the story in our 2024 community survey of how, after 9/11, several New Yorkers discovered that WFC was the first place they thought of going if they had to leave the city. We heard several reflections on how, in its secularism, WFC offers some an experience of "true religion or spirituality."

This last year has been a year of hard work and learning, of listening and of imagining – a year establishing the basis for us to support WFC growing into its next chapter, building on the strong foundation of what is and collective dreams of what can be while taking on necessary challenges to be resilient into the future.

We look forward to exploring new frontiers together – creating more fully winterized spaces and a four-season meeting room / multi-use space at Uphaus Lodge; welcoming more retreat groups and growing the community service dimensions of our mission throughout the year; trying out a second year of the Summer Social Justice Institute for a broader age range; continuing to grow the beautiful gardens relaunched in summer 2024; finding new ways to tell the history of WFC alongside the indigenous history of the lands we are privileged to steward, for the broader community and for future generations.

In all these endeavors, and in the primary responsibility of holding the existing space that WFC must continue to be, we look to you for partnership – partnership that may come through volunteering during the summer, making a donation or connecting us with a donor, sharing your ideas and knowledge through a working group or committee, etc. Whatever the future holds, it is this partnership that will ensure this space remains a haven for exchange, reflection, and inspiration, as we tap into our collective strength.

Thank you for all that you do for the world <u>and</u> for making WFC part of your world.

# Kicking off a new WFC program: the Summer Social Justice Institute (SSJI)

In summer 2024, we piloted a new Summer Social Justice Institute (SSJI), a seven-week program for young/aspiring activists hoping to pursue a career/life working for social justice – built around the manifold opportunities to deepen learning from presenters over the course of the summer and through intergenerational dialogue between activists of all ages.

With eight participants in the first cohort coming from five U.S. states and from Ghana – along with regular pop-in staff, volunteers, and guest participants – the inaugural year brought new energy into the social justice space at WFC, with regular *Activism on the Porch* sessions – workshops on writing letters to political prisoners or teach-ins to help us find our collective voice on the ongoing civil war in Sudan – and no fewer than five pop-up presentations by SSJI participants or young summer staff/volunteers on topics ranging from the Philippines' war on drugs, butchness and queer masculinities, the rising influence of Russia in the Sahel, the embargo on Cuba, and Nigeria's #EndSars protests by the #SoroSoke ("speak out") generation.

Learning lessons from this pilot experience, we will be further innovating SSJI as we prepare for the 2025 summer season, opening it up to a broader range of ages, and offering options for both long-term and shorter-term participation – as well as adapting to the new frontiers of activism and organizing we will need to explore in the U.S. during this next challenging chapter.

With your support, we also hope to be able to offer travel stipends to young activists from across the U.S. and around the globe who cannot afford their own travel costs, and also to be able to bring more seasoned activists to support the program by offering activist-in-residence fellowships. Thank you in advance for helping us continue to grow this space at WFC, fostering progressive activism and facilitating cross-generational and cross-movement learning.
