To the beloved WFC community,

From the shock of last November to the "shock and awe" that began at a relentless pace in January, it is hard to find the right words to offer solace and hope to our community as this year draws to a close. Yet, we have a somewhat unusual perspective on all that is unfolding – and that is what we have to offer in this moment.

Our perspective is one of two people who did NOT live through the first Trump administration as a daily reality, but rather took it in from afar with regular doses of Nigerian pepper sauce. In 2025, thus, still newly reorienting to a United States that has changed dramatically in the 13+ years we lived primarily overseas, our disorientation may well have been double that of others who rather sighed, "Well, here we go again."

Yet, our perspective from being grounded for many years in the type of "competitive authoritarianism" towards which the U.S. is now rapidly careening makes the strategies and modalities of this administration feel remarkably familiar. The daily recalculations of grassroots organizing in the face of the onslaught, the necessity of constantly tapping into new wells of community spirit to find optimism and hope to fuel persistent action, the knowledge that what we need to hold onto is the very thing they are trying to destroy – we know this well. And most importantly, we find our eyes flickering all the time between the visions of how far things *could go* and how much we still have that is still working, still intact, still abundant – ready to be harnessed.

We can reflect on the last year of arranging trainings and facilitating community conversations at World Fellowship and supporting the organizing of our local community that has come together to form the Mount Washington Valley Resistance; we can re-read the WFC Board Statement & Call to Action of February 7, 2025; we can flip through pictures of demonstrations organized, relentlessly, from February to November – all this is useful to see how much has been nurtured and catalyzed and supported through the space WFC offers to many.

We can also try to step back and look at the emerging lessons of this moment that point to where we need to go in our organizing work and community conversations over the months ahead: root causes of tribalism in partisan politics that tear communities asunder into "us" and "them" as we pursue victory through narrow margins rather than commonality of unifying messages; divergent media and social media universes that make it ever harder to have a common factual basis for clashing viewpoints; the issues that still divide the left.

From here, it is our task to see how to use the spaces we are privileged to steward, and the communities in which we are so fortunate to find a multiplicity of homes, to forge ahead with daily persistent action – not losing sight of the broader perspective that we need to avoid pitfalls and missteps we can so easily fall into. Yes, there are a lot of specifics. But that is the broader goal. And we hope we can continue this journey together.

We are grateful to know there's next summer. We are grateful we can frequent Whitton Pond and the places of quiet peace and beauty throughout the seasons, and for the intergenerational community that cherishes these places with us. We are happy to be able to keep tending the gardens that have gone from reestablishment in 2023 to expansion in 2025 – and to donate our kale and greens to fuel local mutual aid during times of need.

Dear World Fellowship Community,

This year we are proud to report that the World Fellowship Center, despite the assault on democracy in our country, the ongoing genocide in Gaza, the persistent war in Ukraine, to name just a few disasters, is thriving. Under the inspiring and energetic leadership of Megan Chapman and Andrew Maki, in their second full year as Co-Executive Directors, together with the dedicated staff and volunteers they assembled, WFC has kept true to its core objectives while expanding into new areas.

This year's accomplishments include:

- Developing and fundraising for installing solar arrays toward the goal of establishing energy independence
- Enlarging the organic gardens to supply fresh vegetables in greater quantity and to cover a longer season
- Expanding the typically robust summer program through a weekly social justice film series, concerts in many genres, and regular community meetings
- Welcoming an increasing number of retreat and other groups, including a Zimbabwean girls math camp, New Hampshire environmental educators, and a leftist marching band, as well as a second year of the Summer Social Justice Institute
- Building strong relationships with other New Hampshire social justice organizations, including conducting immigration "Know Your Rights" training, organizing weekly "Walkout Wednesday" visibility actions, and working on the "No Kings" rally and attendant mutual aid fair.

In collaboration with our core staff, the Board is prepared to focus on long-term strategies, including:

- Conditions and improvements in buildings
- Use of our extensive campus
- Development and growth of on-site and virtual year-round programing
- Connections with local social justice organizations

We look forward to working with the community on these challenges.

Dear Friends,

We write to bring you up to date on our exciting plans to install solar panels on the roof of the Bath House and behind Uphaus Lodge. If we can raise the \$150,000 this will cost, the panels will provide 115% of our electrical needs each year — so that this big up-front investment will significantly offset our carbon footprint.

Together, these installations will pay for themselves in saved electric bills over the next 10-15 years. Besides 'walkin' our talk', investing in solarization is a strong statement of support towards the future of WFC.

As a not-for-profit organization, we have until July 4, 2026, to get the panels installed but to avoid some additional requirements we must purchase all the materials in 2025 to take full advantage of (Biden era) government subsidies. Thanks to the extraordinary generosity of a few community members, we are almost halfway towards our goal and we're hoping you can help get us the rest of the way.

How did we already get halfway towards our goal? In July, an anonymous donor offered a \$25,000 matching gift! Your round-ups this summer raised the first \$15,000 towards this match, your monthly support has come to \$4,400, and other solar-specific gifts, including loans forgiven, have added close to \$13,000. In the last month, another donor has stepped forward to offer another \$25,000 matching gift towards this goal.

We are aiming to raise the remaining \$67,600 by the end of the year. Can you get us over the top by offering our next matching gift? By making a one-time special donation? By increasing your monthly support? As ever, we are deeply grateful for your support in whatever ways you are able. Thank you!

# Fighting Fascism Then and Now: Abraham Lincoln Brigade Plaque at WFC

Locked in a vault in the NH State House for 24 years, a plaque honoring the New Hampshire veterans of the Abraham Lincoln Brigade finally found a new home at WFC in July 2025. *But why is this plaque so important?* In 1936, the Neutrality Act made it illegal for Americans to go to Spain where the fight against fascism that previewed the ambitions of Hitler and Mussolini was already raging. Defying the law of the time (the First Neutrality Act of 1935 enacted during a period of isolationism), about 2,800 brave Americans from different walks of life joined the international Abraham Lincoln Brigade to defend the Spanish Republic against Franco's fascist invasion in what became the Spanish Civil War.

Over the last few decades, a few states have erected plaques and memorials to honor the courage and sacrifice of members of the Lincoln Brigade. In 2001, New Hampshire was poised to follow suit, with a plaque honoring the Brigade members from the state. Yet, just an hour after the plaque was installed on a State House wall, it was removed due to outcry from NH conservatives – the same fate as the Elizabeth Gurley Flynn historical marker suffered in 2023!

Attended by over 75 people, the unveiling of the plaque at WFC included opening remarks by former NH State Senator Burt Cohen who originally led the effort to see the plaque commissioned, a performance by Dan and Molly Watt, the son and daughter-in-law of Lincoln Brigade member George Watt, and surprise appearances by NH State Representative Luz Bay and the Abraham Lincoln Brigade Archive (ALBA) executive director Mark Wallem.

The plaque bears particular significance to numerous long-time WFC community members whose relatives served in the Abraham Lincoln Brigade or were otherwise connected to the U.S. activism of these "premature anti-fascists."

The timing could not be more apt. Against the specter of rising fascism within the US, the re-installation of this plaque is a moment of reckoning with attempts at historical erasure and the true legacy of previous generations of freedom fighters in whose steps many of us now follow. Events like this make us ever more convinced we should keep singing Woody Guthrie: "...the people of this world are getting organized... you bound to lose, you fascists, bound to lose."
